DAVE LODDER Secret Santa

It was Christmas nine years ago when Dave Lodder, with no family in Cincinnati. decided to deliver food and clothes to the homeless. Dave tells the story how he met a family with two little girls. "I had cookies, candy and a couple toys by chance and the kids

went crazy over nothing. That is when I knew I needed things for kids and this has been my Christmas ever since." So one Christmas morning's delivery has grown to five truckloads and three days of delivering gifts to shelters like Bethany and families living in motels. People heard about Dave's work and started donating. This year Dave added a fundraiser to help buy toys and said "a drop box has gone over more than I could have ever expected."

Most women do not think of a bra as a "luxury" item but rather as a necessity. Women experiencing homelessness have very limited income and like most moms, the kids come first. Bras and many other necessities tend to fall to the bottom of the priority list.

Thanks to The Erica J. Holloman Foundation, Bethany House mothers have received hundreds of brand new bras over the last several years. Every summer the foundation collects brand new bras, which are then donated to battered women, homeless shelters and back-to-work programs. The goal is to help women feel better about themselves and to instill a sense of support and confidence.

Erica J. Holloman was a confident and very

After shopping for toys, she delivered them to Bethany House in time for the moms to select gifts they knew their children would like.

Transportation is a challenge for homeless families and that challenge continues when families arrive at Bethany's emergency shelter. Bethany House needs a new van to transport families.....



To obtain needed information, i.e. birth certificates, driver's licenses, court documents

To and from the Board of Education for school enrollment

To childcare centers to enroll in daycare

To area health centers and/or hospitals

To search for apartments

To St. Vincent de Paul, Salvation Army, and the Freestore Foodbank

To the main Fairmount campus from off-site locations (apartments and hotels) for Life Skills Classes, to meet with a Case Manager and Mental Health Clinician

And this is the short list!

Our 2007 Ford E350 14-passenger van has 230,000 miles. With anywhere from 120 to 160 people in our four locations each day, you can understand why we need a new van (or two) to accomplish all of our daily trips.

Good Shepherd Catholic Church, longtime supporters of Bethany House, heard about the need for a van and launched Bethany House's new Transportation Fund with the donation of \$10,000. Our goal is to leverage this gift with other donations to get a new van and eventually a new truck. Speaking of trucks, our 1995 box truck was recently sent to the graveyard! We need a truck to pick up donations and more importantly, move families into their homes.

This winter our shelter is overflowing! Families come from living in their cars or on the streets and knock on our doors in the freezing cold with no place to go. Families are sleeping on sofas in our third floor lounge, on roll-a-ways in the basement and we have nine families living in hotel rooms.

Many of the women at Bethany House are raising their children alone. That is difficult enough but throw housing instability and financial insecurity into the mix and it can be downright scary for a young mother. When volunteers graciously reach out by providing a meal, that act of kindness truly makes a giant impact. Sometimes a touch of love and concern during dark times in someone's life is just what they need to get back on track.

Our Fairmount shelter regularly has 45+ moms and kids. You might imagine that dinnertime would be chaotic with so many people and even though space is tight - very tight - the atmosphere at the shelter is full of relief, gratitude and a sense of family. This is particularly evident during dinner and we have our volunteers to thank for that!
